Club regularly conducts events, monthly runs for its members and assists community organisations with attendance at community events, retirement homes, parades and car shows.


The Club's recently constructed Club Room caters for a range of activities such as Club gatherings, meetings and is often our starting point for runs.

The Star of the Show......

You are right if you guessed that the red Ford F100 in the Channel 9 promo for "The Block" is one of ours. John Marks' '53 model features on the ad and is driven by leading actor Scott Cam.

It all happened after a phone call from a Geelong based agent who procures vehicles for various productions. The request was for a red Ford Mainline, but as the only example discovered was interstate, the priority changed to a red Ford ute of the era. It seems that Mainlines were rarely red. Have you ever seen one?

The promo (which is not an episode) depicts a younger Scott Cam (he wears a wig with his "young" makeup) calling on the construction and tenants at the cream brick houses in Hampton East, and set in the 1950's.

The agent had put the request to Mark Reilly, who often provides or sources the required item, and Mark kindly mentioned the "Effie". Not being familiar with the goings on at The Block, my first question was: will it be useful as a manual driver. Oh yes, was the answer, the driver is mature aged and can easily handle that.

I provided a few photos, particularly with the tailboard down and showing a height comparison. Next was a personal visit at Werribee by the director and his assistant. After that a contract arrived, and subsequently a D/D to my bank for \$900.

Call out on location was 8:30-9:00am, and the Ford was the first to arrive, with the road marshals flocking around to admire and discuss. They were all classic-car tragics. In due course we had 6 or 8 other cars. One of the best was a common old FB Holden sedan, but so perfect it jumped at you. Another was an International milk truck, which was brought down from Ballarat. Then a Ford Victoria with a stand-out duco combination of black and mauve. You will also see a two-tone Pontiac and a Twin Spinner ute. I can't remember the others, and I am still kicking myself for not taking the iPad to capture all the images.

The Ford is driven short distances by Scott, and some of the action features him punching out a document on an old type-writer set on the tailboard, hence the height issue. The Ford's gas pedal can be a bit sensitive, but Scott handled it well. I was told that he owns a few classic cars, some of rare and high value. A split rear-window Corvette Stingray was mentioned.

During the day I was glued to the action and chatting with the friendly cast and crew. The tenants were young men and women all magnificently presented for the era. I was never asked to get out of the way, and at lunchtime a great spread was served in the backyard. A large mobile coffee machine with attendant would serve you anytime at the raise of a pinky finger.

Action finished rather late, and arriving home I noticed a fake black and white number plate HPA157 still covering the red club plate on the front bumper. I remember a '56 Series 1 Landrover HOK396, my original '53 F100 GDK657, and a 1947 Ford Super-Deluxe sedan KW195. (Should have kept them all). The fake plate is now pride of place in the shed, as no-one called to claim it. Keep an eye on Channel 9 or check out The Block 2023 on-line?

Thanks Mark, an enjoyable and rewarding day.

Holden on to history can now set you back \$50k

ed Bullpitt from Kingswood Country once famously said: "You don't drive a Kingswood, you make love to it. That's why nuns only drive Toranas".

Such classic vehicles live on thanks to car lovers like New Zealander Andre Hawke.

Andre, 39, was given his family's poo-brown 1978 HZ Holden Kingswood five-litre 308 V8 by his dad more than 20 years ago.

But the young lad had his sights set elsewhere - a Nissan Skyline - and sold it in 2001 for \$2500.

Fast-forward 22 years and Andre found the Kingswood's manual and decided to track the car's owner down. He ended up buying the car back (pictured) for \$50,000 knowing it was probably "the worst investment you could ever make".

His story, told this week by the New Zealand Herald, has gone viral. Imagine buying your old car back

for 20 times what you sold it for. It could only happen to a Kingswood.

As Hawke explains: "It's more than just a car. It's the feeling you get when you're in it and the memories that flood back."

What would the younger generation make of such a financially reckless act?

These days, cars - whether they are drivable or not - aren't seen as beloved members of the family to be lovingly passed down.

Maybe it's just because I drive a

ten-year-old Ford Territory. But it's hard to imagine feeling the same attachment to a modern car like a seven-seater Kia Carnival or a Hyundai Santa Fe.

I certainly wouldn't pay 20 times more to buy back my first car.

It was a 15-year-old Audi Fox so crappy it broke down just about every time I drove it. I had to routinely build in time for the RACV to arrive when I went out with friends.

My father was kind enough to buy the car for me and my sister and paid handsomely for the biggest lemon on the second-hand car lot.

There are still a few Audi Foxes around -Frank from SA is selling a 1978 model for \$10,000 on one car sales site. Someone needs to tell him he's dreamin'.

My dad's first new car was a sexy red two-door Monaro HK with black upholstery and a 186 engine. He bought it in 1968 for \$4000, and it

could go 95 miles an hour on dirt

The Monaro muscle car was billed as "Australia's first sports machine ...

without the fancy foreign price tag". Remember the old Monaro ads?

"Man seeks excitement by instinct. Monaro supplies it by design. Beneath the beauty lurks the beast," one said.

"It's out to drive you wild," said another. "Monaro – make him show

My dad's next car was a white HO Kingswood, which he bought in the early 1970s. I still remember the caramel-coloured vinyl seats that got so hot we'd have to sit on towels and the metal seat belt buckles that heated up like branding irons in the

The Kingswood always got us home safely - whether it was across the Nullarbor or just a few streets away after a party; sometimes with

my dad balancing on the bonnet trying not to spill his last beer of the night.

Back then, the Kingswood was billed as the "car that drives as well as it looks".

Things got even sexier by 1974 when Holden released the Sandman, its panel van for surfies which was promoted as an "escape machine".

"Move me, Sandman," said the ad. The car wasn't the only thing that was moving, trust me.

It's telling that the type of Monaro that my dad had in the late 1960s are still for sale, and some of the most powerful versions now sell for more than \$200,000. And classic Kingswoods from the 1970s, even those which have done 350,000km, are going for \$30,000.

I'm not surprised. With the closure of the local car industry, we'll never see such vehicles again.

So, in honour of Andre and his awesome purchase, let's pay tribute to the Kingswood and cars like it.

All hail the Torana SLR 500 - the car "with hair on its chest".

And the Monaro - the "machine to light your fire".

And the Sandman, which was "equipped for action".

If Andre wants to keep going, I know a Nissan Skyline 2001 he could pay big bucks for ...

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
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


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
